## 2021 Reunion Dinner and AGM

### Dinner update from your Committee

#### 2020 Dinner Cancelled

Unfortunately, we were unable to hold the reunion dinner last year due to the COVID19 pandemic and the restrictions we were under at the time. At that time we were hopeful that by September of 2021 we would be free of those restrictions and able to hold our dinner as normal.

#### 2021 Outlook

Whilst the outlook is getting better, our intended venue the Marsh Farm Hotel, Royal Wootton Bassett, is "**Closed Until Further Notice**". This means that we are unable to make our usual plans and send out the dinner reply forms with our news letter.

#### Plans for 2021

So, what are our plans we hear you ask?

Well, we still intend to hold the dinner on 4<sup>th</sup> September as advertised, but would ask you all to be patient while we wait for the government to ease the COVID19 restrictions, allowing hospitality venues to reopen. The restrictions that may be in place at the time of the dinner are unknown and we would need to plan the dinner around those restrictions.

#### Cut-Off Date

To enable us to plan for the dinner properly, the committee have discussed our options and feel that we must set a cut-off date to give us, and you, time to finalise the plans for the dinner. That cut-off date is **03 July 2021**. If, on that date we are unable to make meaningful plans for the dinner and AGM, we will sadly have to cancel the 2021 dinner.

**A SUMMARY OF THIS WEEK'S DEFENCE ANNOUNCEMENTS**

**Overview.** Details of the Integrated Review (IR) are included in the

public documents at the link attached. These documents and videos set out the overall intent only and no details have yet been announced that impact the Corps directly. REME RHQ will now be included in the planning activity to shape the decisions over the coming months so that the Corps remains fit for the demands of the next decade and beyond.

**Structural Changes.** What we do know is that the Army will retain a 'Theatre Sustainment Brigade' and two 'Operational Sustainment Brigades'. It has also been stated that the Army's new Brigade Combat Teams will contain Combat Service Support Battalions that include logisticians, electrical and mechanical engineers, and medics. How many, where they sit in the structure and their precise role is subject to further detailed work by HoC CSS, supported by REME



RHQ, and confirmed in the Autumn. Reserve structures will be the focus of the MOD Reserve Forces 30 paper due to be released in May 21.

**The REME Strategy.** The REME Strategy will be developed to align with the themes of the IR, and the REME Skills Review will incorporate these themes to ensure that our soldiers remain prepared and relevant to face the challenges of the future.

**The 'Lived Experience'.** Several pan-Defence initiatives will enhance living and working conditions for our people. Across Defence, £1.3Bn will be spent over 4 years to upgrade Single Living Accommodation. There will also be a Digital People Strategy that will enhance career management across Defence using digital applications to improve accessibility for our people. Additionally, Defence will become a more family-friendly employer, investing in spousal employment initiatives and spending £1.4Bn over the next decade on wraparound childcare.

**Next Steps.** We will continue to keep you informed with any further significant updates and decisions as the planning develops over the coming months.

## Vice-Chairman

### A short introduction

I joined the Army on 15 February 1998 and completed an intensive basic training course at Army Training Regiment (Pirbright) from March to May that same year. After completion of basic military training I attended my Armourers Basic Training course at SEME Bordon.



In May 2000 I arrived at my first unit, Queens Royal Hussars, Germany, deploying on exercises Ulan Eagle and Med Man and then on tour to Op AGRICOLA 14. On return from operations we were immediately deployed on the fireman's strike in the UK, Op Fresco.

After this I was promoted to LCpl and posted to 1st Battalion Royal Regiment of Wales, Germany and deployed on Op TELIC 3. Upon return I attended Class 1 training, SEME Bordon and on successful completion returned to Paderborn, Germany, 1st Battalion Princess of Wales Royal Regiment remaining there until 2006.

On promotion to Cpl I was posted to 12 Regiment Royal Artillery, Sennelager Germany. Here I was selected by trawl to return to Iraq on Op TELIC 11. Once back I was promoted to Sgt and selected for Artificer training after a brief posting with 4Bn REME and a deployment on Op HERRICK 10.

Upon completion of Artificer training and promotion to SSgt I moved back to Germany for the last time at Fallingbostal,

2CS Bn REME. During this time I was selected to deploy as a Weapons instructor to Op SHADER and teach the local soldiers weapon maintenance in support of the fight against Isis. Upon return I was selected for promotion WO2 (AQMS) and posted to Army HQ Training Development Team as the analyst on Recovery Mechanics.

Now promoted to WO1(ASM), with the role of Armourer Analyst in the same department and seeing many name changes. One of which sees us under the newly formed Land Warfare Centre, Equipment Support Requirement Setting Team based at the REME home of MOD Lyneham.

A very keen hockey player, playing for the Corps Mens side and as time has gone by the Corps Veterans team. I also coach at a local club teaching children under 10 the sport whilst also playing for the club.

## Veterans Railcard

The new **Veterans Railcard** is now on sale supporting UK Veterans and their families with savings on rail travel. The discounted rail fares are valid for travel from 5 November 2020.

If you have served for at least one day in Her Majesty's Armed Forces (Regular or Reserve) or have been a Merchant Mariner who has seen duty on legally defined military operations, you may be eligible.



The Veterans Railcard is on sale for an introductory price of just £21 for one year, until 31 March 2021. That's a saving of £9 on the normal retail price of £30.

A 3-year Railcard is also available for an introductory price of just £61, if purchased before 31 March 2021, instead of the normal retail price of £70.

The Veterans Railcard offers savings of 1/3 on rail travel, whether your are visiting family and friends or simply enjoying a day out.

You can also nominate a companion to get 1/3 off when travelling with you and up to 4 children travelling with you get 60% off.

## Hadrians Old Boys

Those of you who are ex apprentices from Carlisle will probably know of **Hadrians Old Boys Association** and have perhaps attended one of the annual reunions held at Carlisle. Link [HERE](#)

The Apprentice "School" was formed at Hadrians Camp in 1959 and opened for it's first apprentices in 1960. Those first apprentices were a mixture of new tradesmen and a number transferred from Arborfield and Chepstow. The duration of training was initially three years and covered apprenticeships for Armourers, Gun Fitters, Vehicle Mechanics and Instrument Mechanics.

In 1966 title "School" was dropped and became "College" and the three year apprenticeship was compressed into two years. This only lasted for three years before the College was closed in 1969 and the training reverted to Arborfield.

Training initially revolved around all things military, (no wearing civvies for the first three months - J Company), first a short haircut, then getting issued with all of your kit, learning how to put a uniform on and look smart, bulling boots, blanching webbing, polishing brass, and ironing trousers without putting in tramlines! And of course how to make a bed block!

Then off to the drill square to learn how to march together, interspersed with classroom work, maths, english, map reading and engineering drawing.

The trade training started with basic engineering skills, bench fitting, blacksmithing, sheet metal work and welding. But it wasn't until after the first three months that you were introduced to your trades, and for us Armourers, finally

starting to learn about weapons. But first more basic training, how to repair woodwork, butts, fore ends and hand guards. The best fun was to be had when oil blackening screws and nuts and bolts. The cabinet was open fronted and if you got the oil too hot, guess what, a fire would erupt with black smoke everywhere!

When we finally got to the weapons themselves, we were introduced to the Lee Enfield, (it was apparently still in service then), and the good old Webley Revolver. Our instructor for the pistol never wore ear defenders on the range because he had gone deaf from years of firing weapons. We on the other hand had to make do with 4x2 stuffed into our ears, (health and safety would have a field day now!).

Life as an apprentice wasn't hard if you were willing to fit in with the military discipline and work hard to achieve good grades at the education and trade exams. There was a NAAFI and cinema and those who had reached the age of 18 could legally purchase alcohol.

Pay was £3 3s 0d a week, of that you received 10s a week, the rest being put into a Post Office account, so that you had money when on leave. That's if you didn't lose it to the card sharps on the train home!



## SEME Remembered

Working from Home has given me time to reflect on the changes in training, even during my brief time as an Armourer.



I remember walking in through the hallowed portals of **Building 57 in Bordon** during 1972. After a quick walk-around, “this is the armoury, these are the toilets and don’t talk to those in white coats” (Instrument Technicians), we were ushered into the stores to collect our tool bags and publications that were to cover the complete course. Duly issued with our leather bags and what felt like 20 publications but was no doubt only 12 we commenced our armourer training. We didn’t really count Bench Fitting, Welding, Blacksmithing, Sheet metal work or academics as part of our trade – how wrong was I in later years!



First subject on the agenda in “**God’s Trade**” was woodwork, how many of you can remember fitting a slit patch, butt heel or wood pinning where you were only allowed a cigarette paper width glue line? And once you achieved the standard you then had to fit the woodwork to the

weapon. How many hours does it take to float a barrel of the No.8 rifle or a sniper rifle?

After woodwork it was rifles, pistols, SMG, Machine Guns (4 varieties), support weapons and at the end a practical and theory examination on all the weapon systems. In December 1972 I duly popped out of the other end as a newly qualified Armourer, and boy was I proud.

### And Now

Fast forward through my regular army career and my NRPS career and you can now find me on the other side of the training spectrum. Yes, I’m of the 10% of the 10% of the 10%, a qualified trainer of Armourers at MOD Lyneham, but instead of being a Civil Servant like the trainers when I went through, I work for Babcock



International (Land).

So how has the training changed? Well it has and it hasn’t, we still use hand made models (nothing beats an oversized model of a trigger mechanism), but the old overhead projector and acetate films have



gone to be replaced by the “**VLE**” (virtual learning environment) on the internet. Also, all those EMERS/AESP’s have gone to be replaced by **TDOL** (technical documents on line), Oh and before I forget,



no more lugging that tool bag around –



Just to make things easier, with all this technology the trainees have to use, they have a practical and theory exam at the end of each weapon system rather than one huge exam at the end.

Our trade is constantly changing and I feel that we as Armourers are up to the challenge of adapting to that change, whether we are at the start of our career or, like me, quickly approaching retirement.

### Footnote:

After **nearly 50 years** in the trade, 3 weapon systems still exist. L7 GPMG & Tripod, HMG .50 Machine Gun & Tripod (both of which I teach) and the OML 81mm Mortar. You can’t beat quality.

every weapon system has its own **dedicated tool boxes**.

How many remember viewing barrels? We now have VR (Virtual Reality) barrel viewing as an added extra. Imagine being able to shrink down to the size that would enable you to walk through the barrel!

We now have a Media Department who make video’s and 3D modelling that is utilised on the VLE. At a push we even sometimes use YouTube!

## Membership Revoked

*In November of last year the following notice was sent out to all Association Members:*

"A large number of you may be aware that we have two members of the Association who have been imprisoned for firearms offences, **Peter Laidler** and **Robert Green**.

The committee had discussed the issue of their membership when it became known that both had been found guilty of the offences and sent to prison. **Peter Laidler for 3 years** and **Robert Green for 6 years**. At that time it was felt that both were not fit to be members of our Association.

The committee were guided by **paragraph 3e** of the "Armourers' Association Rules" which states:

**"The committee shall have the right to disqualify any member who in their opinion is considered unworthy of retaining membership of the Association."**

It was decided that members attending the

AGM to be held on 7th September 2020 before the Annual Dinner, would be given the opportunity to have their say in the matter. But, due to the COVID19 restrictions, the dinner and AGM were unable to go ahead and it has been decided by the committee that the matter should be brought to a close.

Our new Chairman, **Ted Holroyd** states:

*"I believe that anyone who brings our trade and calling into such public disrepute should have their membership of our Association revoked."*

The committee, bearing in mind paragraph 3e of the rules above, have therefore decided that both **Peter Laidler** and **Robert Green** shall have their **membership** of the Armourers' Association **revoked with immediate effect**.

**The committees decision in this matter is final."**

### *Editors Note:*

*The decision was widely accepted by most members of the Association. However, one member disagreed so strongly with the committees' decision that he resigned his membership.*

*Also, for those of you unaware, the offences of the two individuals are not connected.*
